

Richard Ivy – AWA secretary



He has missed woodturning this past year. Richard Ivy is a self-proclaimed Army brat, he moved this last year in to his 47th home and is getting close to having his new shop done. Richard has lots going on in his life --he's an architect, working on a dream to improve the Native American graduation rate, active in his church – just to mention a few. Although a busy guy, he is looking forward to talking to the wood and letting the wood talk to him as he creates something new on his lathe.

Richard had the love of wood instilled in him from a very early age. He can remember when he was 6 years old and his Dad created 4 chairs and a table out of some barrels. His Dad was always building something. Although Richard took his first turning class in Virginia many years ago, his turning has expanded and become one of his great relaxing hobbies in the last nine years.

"Free" is his favorite wood. We hear that answer a lot – but Richard even demonstrated it as we pulled up to his house. He was just coming home from a meeting and saw someone cutting a tree down – he stopped and they gave him four big pieces. He is trying to figure out what type of wood, not sure if it will turn well or if it will be firewood. He enjoys mesquite and African Sumac but any "free" wood is good.

Asking him what pushes him to his limits – his answer was quick – watching other turners. Watching what can be done and trying it himself, is a great accomplishment. Richard talks about how open and sharing woodturners are, nothing is a secret, turners want to share with other turners. He feels the education available through American Association of Woodturners is phenomenal. Each month at the AWA meetings he says is like "a place for free education", between the instant gallery, the demonstrations, the sharing from other turners is invaluable. It just can't be beat.

Richard's advice to beginning turners? Learn your tools, don't cut too far and too fast, learn patience, and ask for help. There are lots of willing experienced woodturners who are glad to help out.

You can ask Richard about his biggest woodturning mistake – they both come from using a band saw and both involve his left "pinkie", but we won't go in to that... Being careful around equipment is a high priority.

What has been his biggest challenge? He joked – wanting to always buy something new. I think every turner can identify with that challenge. Richard says he knows he doesn't "need" it but there is always some new tool. Which brought us to Lyle Jamieson's hollowing system. Even if he may not have Lyle's hollowing system (he saw him at SWAT & AWA), he says he learned and enjoyed the demos. A challenge as far as woodturning – that would be root balls. He also has some Jarrah Burl that he anticipates being an upcoming challenge.

Richard is in his words a "nuts & bolts" architect and not the artistic type design architect. His "nuts & bolts" life has him enjoying woodturning. Teaching and turning with his grandson, Andrew, is a highlight in his life. Although Richard has lots going on in his life -- wondering where his architectural talents and desire to help Native Americans graduate will lead him – he keeps moving forward. He knows that soon his shop will be done (maybe by the time this goes to print). He's looking forward to the woodturning and he will just let the wood talk to him.





• Beginner to Intermediate class (all levels): Spindles, Beads, Coves

Class will consist of woodturning basics featuring both bowls and spindles.

The morning will be spent turning spindles with beads and coves focusing on cutting downhill, tool selection and usage, and why the direction of the cut matters.

The afternoon will be spent turning bowls and how the process of turning a bowl is related to turning beads and coves on a spindle.

Various chucking techniques will be covered as well as options for cleaning up the bottom of a bowl so that all evidence of how the bowl was chucked can be removed.

This may help to answer the question: "How deep can I hollow with this tool?"

The formula for a round bar requires that you square the diameter twice and then multiply it by .05 to get the Section Modulus for mild steel. Multiply this figure by 5139 and take the square root of that calculation. The result is the length, in inches, that you can reach off of the tool rest without excessive flutter or vibration (<0.040).

For a square or rectangular bar, the formula requires that you multiply the width of the bar by its thickness cubed, and then divide that number by 12. Taking the square root of the result gives you the cantilevered length or permissible overhang.

A rule of thumb is that you have 1/3 of the length of the tool cantilevered, and 2/3 of the overall tool length behind the tool rest.

This information is drawn from "Is It Heavy Enough?" by Dale Hupp, as published by American Woodturner, Fall 2001.



I like to burn very fine lines on some of my turnings. I have found the best solution is a guitar string (wire) clamped between two hemostats. You can adjust the length depending on the diameter of your turning. This chart shows the diameter for each note. Hemostats and steel guitar strings are available on eBay and Amazon.




2020 Veteran's Day M&T Classes
