I will give information on coloring wood using air brushes, atomizers and paint brushes. At the end of the day, you should understand the materials and equipment I use and why, as well as when to color and not.


I have done some form of woodworking since the age of seven, with woodturning being most of my focus for the last 31 years.

Past President's Message – May 2023

As now Past President of the AWA I would like to thank you for the opportunity. It has been a good couple of years, thanks to a great Board of Directors. We have accomplished a lot in two years. Here are a few of those accomplishments:

- 1. We located and have archived important AWA incorporation papers and have made sure that required yearly reports are updated and current.
- 2. We reviewed the bylaws and updated them which was long overdue.
- 3. We developed a regular board meeting schedule and have kept to that schedule, thanks in part to Zoom, for the full two years. The board met the first Tuesday of each month.

- 9. We have established a regular monthly newsletter and website, thanks to the hard work of Pat Jones, our web master and newsletter editor.

There are several things that were "in process" and the new board of directors can move them forward. One is strengthening the Shorty Fund program, and another is finding ways to fund raise for the AWA to help defray operating expenses and continue to invest in other things to benefit our members.

Richard January, our new AWA President, has worked hard as a board member and volunteered in other capacities, such as being the photographer, a member of the KLC committee and coordinating volunteer efforts at state and county fairs. Micro-Crystalline Wax / Polish

Tip from Dale Guilford

This stuff is great...not just for your turnings...but also as a lubricant! I have not been a big fan of wax as a finish or topcoat on my turnings, but I finally decided to give this a try. It is easy to apply and doesn't take much and leaves a nice luster when buffed. It is also great on old turnings that need to be renewed. However, the biggest surprise is how well it works on the lathe bed ways. Better than WD-40, paraffin, and silicone. Next, I am going to try it in bar form on the bed ways. Less costly in bar form. If you want to try it, search "micro-crystalline wax".






Laser for hollow turning After going through half a dozen laser pens while hollow turning with my Jamieson system, I purchased a universal pistol laser and attached it to an Allen wrench and then slid the wrench into the pen slot. The pistol laser can handle the shocks associated with the hollowing process. I purchased the pistol laser on eBay for under \$20.

Sharpening oval skew chisels Dress your grinding wheel to get it clean and straight across. Mark the bevel of the skew chisel with a black marker so that you can easily see if the entire cutting edge has been sharpened. Use a Veritas grinding jig for skew chisels and attach two small magnets under the oval skew chisel to keep it from rocking side to side. A small mirror can be used to view the bevel from underneath as the edge is being sharpened. – Joe Cavanaugh, Vienna, VA



Resharpen with confidence To re-sharpen the same tool, reset the angle gauge to zero as before. Pull the toolrest away from the grinding wheel and tighten the toolrest support arm to the base. Then, with the angle gauge on the toolrest, adjust the toolrest to the angle you had previously recorded for that tool. Make sure to position your wooden spacer against the grinding wheel when moving the toolrest back in place to ensure consistency. Remove the spacer and sharpen your tool.

It is that quick and easy. I write the angle required for each tool on a piece of colored electrical tape wrapped around the tool for easy reference. —Denis Delehanty, Virginia

The Workshop and Turning Environment General Considerations

Don't use a lathe in damp or wet locations or in the presence of flammable liquids, vapors, or gases.

Always keep a fully charged fire extinguisher close at hand.

Frequently remove shavings from the floor while turning.



Eliminate all slipping or tripping hazards from the floor around the lathe and work area.

Do not be distracted. Keep pets out of the shop. Ask family members to enter the shop carefully if the lathe is running, so you aren't startled, and to wait until you turn off the lathe before trying to get your attention.

Use a powered dust-extraction system to remove wood dust and other air-suspended particles while sanding or generating any form of dust.

Floor Mats Having a good rubber anti-fatigue mat to stand on instead of a hard concrete floor helps reduce leg and back fatigue. A mat can also reduce damage to dropped tools.

Lighting Keep your work area well lit. Adequate lighting is important not only for seeing the work but also for reducing eye fatigue and, over time, eye damage. Ideally each station should have good overhead lighting as well as a moveable work lamp to provide more direct light on the project. Lights with protective shields are recommended.

Extension Cords Avoid using extension cords if possible. Guard against electric shock. Inspect electric cords for damage. Use of extension cords that cross traffic areas should be avoided.

Eye and Face Protection Having at least minimal protection in place to reduce the chances that flying projectiles will reach and damage the eyes or face should be a common-sense no-brainer for ANYONE who intends to stand at the lathe.

Full face shields provide the protection needed for bowls, vessels, or any turning involving chucks and faceplates. At a minimum, use safety goggles or safety glasses that have side protectors when turning small items.

Properly adjust the headband and know how to lift the shield for talking. Face shields should be kept clean and free of scratches.
